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
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"Do not fear, for I have redeemed you; I have summoned you by name; you are mine." Isaiah. 43:1 MV

Many have advocated, advised and have lobbied on the behalf of The King's University College. In July, their diligence was rewarded when The King's University College was given permission by the Government of Alberta to change its name to The King's University.

The name change could not have come at a more appropriate time in our history as a postsecondary institution. As we celebrate 35 years, The King's University gives credence to our institutional identity as an institution that is uncompromisingly Christian.

So what's in a name? What in our name makes us a rich community acting in the service of God? The King's University. Did you know that "the definite article "the" is the most frequently used word in English"? I turned to the British Council for their definitive word about the definite article 'the'. According to the British Council, "we use the definite article in front of a noun when we believe the hearer/reader knows exactly what we are referring to." This is a large assumption in today's world.

There are at least four ways the definite article 'the' is used in the English language that are instructive to how we use the word "the", in The King's University. We use the definite article when: there is only one, there is only one in that place, to refer to community, and to refer to a work of art.

1. There is only one.

The King's is uncompromisingly Christian. The definite article in The King's University is a reference to King Jesus, the Servant-King. Our name declares publically our allegiance to God. Rooted in the historic Christian faith, The King's education is informed by the authoritative Word of God as confessed by the early church and expressed in the Nicene and Apostle's creeds.

2. There is only one in a place.

The King's is about the integration of faith and learning. The definite article in The King's University is a reference to our commitment to explicitly weaving faith into both our curriculum and our practice.

3. To refer to community.

The King's is a place where all are welcome. I don't think it is a stretch to say that the definite article 'the' can be used to refer to The King's community. We are united here in one common educational mission. The King's is not a church. Faculty and staff come from a broad range of Christian faith communities. Our students come from an even broader range of faith understandings. This is both invigorating and challenging as we seek to hear, to understand, and to learn together. Our value statements speak to our commitment to mutual encouragement, openness, and respect among students, staff and faculty. Like a family, this is not always easy.

4. To refer to a work of art.

The King's is a place of continuous renewal and reconciliation. There are many beautiful King's moments in our short history. Recently I was fortunate to host one

of The King's earliest graduates. Francis Ruiter was a student at King's in the 1980s. Francis is in the early stages of Alzheimers. He wanted to be able to thank The King's community for the beautiful memories and education he received, while he still remembered. The work of art that is The King's is continually changing. We are a different place now than we were in 1979.

On this our 35th anniversary, we welcome a new chapter in our history with the opening of the Leder School of Business. This is made possible by the faithful vision of four founding donor families called to see business students educated in a way that acknowledges all that our Father has for us in this world including being active participants in His redemptive work. This includes as business persons asked to see the world as more than a monetary bottom line.

As The King's University steps into the next phase in our journey equipped with a new name, blessed with an academic vision to explore the world as followers of Jesus Christ, it is my prayer that God will guide and direct us as we seek to create and to envision new vistas.

CHOIRS TOUR EUROPE

On May 4, 2014, The King's University Chamber Choir and Kappella Kyrie Slavic Chamber Choir, both under the direction of **DR. MELANIE TURGEON**, departed on a twoweek tour to Poland, Slovakia and Hungary. King's faculty member **DR. JOACHIM SEGGER** travelled and performed with the choir, and **PRESIDENT MELANIE HUMPHREYS** also joined the group. The tour included four full concerts, two shorter performances, including a concert at a Nursing Home in Przemysl, Poland, plus singing The Divine Liturgy of St. John Chrysostom at three different Greek Catholic parishes in Poland and Slovakia.


The concerts were well attended and the program was extremely well received. Parish communities would often host the choirs for beautiful, bountiful receptions. The program included two main categories: Ukrainian music (almost exclusively sacred repertoire), and both sacred and secular music by North American composers. The Ukrainian repertoire included contemporary works as well as music dating back to the 18th century. This assortment of Ukrainian repertoire was balanced with a variety of Canadian and American selections from the twentieth and twenty-first centuries.

In addition to performing, the choir members enjoyed sightseeing including a tour of Wieliczka Salt Mine, a visit to Auschwitz and Birkenau concentration camps, a three-night stay in the glorious Krasiczyn Castle Hotel, and a brief visit to Budapest, Hungary. The tour concluded with a farewell dinner at an authentic Hungarian restaurant complete with live ethnic entertainment. Many King's students remained in Europe, or traveled to meet their families at various destinations, while others returned home with the group on May 17, exhausted but fulfilled and inspired from a fabulous time in Central Europe!

Research-Focused Faculty Join King's

The King's University added two new faculty members this September, **DR. JULIE KAYE**, Assistant Professor of Sociology and Director of Community Engaged Research, and **DR. AMY FEAVER**, Assistant Professor of Computing Science and Mathematics.

DR. KAYE has filled the role of Director of Community Engaged Research, recently created at King's. This position helps students – mostly in social science – conduct community research projects for local agencies. "King's already has an environment that values exceptional educational opportunities rooted in the goals of critically reimagining and engaging communities grappling with social injustice. This is the type of environment where community-engaged approaches to research can grow and flourish," says Dr. Kaye.

She has extensive experience, completing her own community engaged research examining human trafficking in Canada. Dr. Kaye holds a PhD in Philosophy from the University of Saskatchewan and recently worked at Ambrose University College.

Dr. Feaver joins The King's University from the University of Colorado Boulder where she completed her PhD in Mathematics. She is a recipient of the Burton W. Jones Teaching Award from the University of Colorado. Her research focuses on algebraic number theory and she recently participated in "Women in Numbers 3", a workshop held at the Banff International Research Station. "I am hoping to help grow the computing science department at King's. The computing science major has a lot to offer students with its small class size and practicum courses. We already offer all of the important core courses, but building the department will allow us to offer a wider variety of electives," says Dr. Feaver. * Dr. Julie Kaye

Launching the Leder School of Business: Commerce education in a new light



t's the newest school of business in Canada, and the only comprehensive Christian School of Business between Winnipeg and Langley. Its positive impact is already being felt, and there's much more to come. Its mandate is to allow the light of Christ to shine through us as Christians in the world of business.

The Leder School of Business at The King's University celebrated its official launch on September 25 with much fanfare, celebration and thanksgiving by almost 200

attendees, from the founding donors and their families, to business, community and political leaders—including the new Alberta Minister of Innovation and Advanced Education, **HONOURABLE DON SCOTT QC** and **MLA DAVID DORWARD**—to the King's community itself, faculty, staff, students, and alumni.

The new school was made possible by the generous investment of four King's donors, successful Christian businessmen and their families who want to make a



difference: JOHN & SALLY LEDER of the Supreme Group (steel and fabrication companies); JIM & MAGDA DYKSTRA, founders of Dykstra Construction; RALPH & JANE BRUINSMA, Triangle Three Services Ltd.; and FRED & MELANIE JOHANNESEN, COBALT Investments Ltd. These four families together pledged \$12 million to make the school a reality—the largest gifts in King's history. Their vision has already attracted other donors to the school. And the positive impact for the rest of King's includes freeing up funds from our overall operating budget that were earmarked for the Commerce program, which now can be applied to other areas of the institution.

"This is a major vote of confidence from our supporting community," says **DR. MELANIE HUMPHREYS**, President of The King's University. "These amazing new gifts from our donors will allow us to expand our Commerce program

through leading edge initiatives, setting King's apart from many other Business programs in Western Canada. Our current Commerce program is highly regarded and has helped launch many successful careers, but limited funding has so far restricted our ability to broaden our course offerings and faculty expertise."

Expanding King's already successful Bachelor of Commerce program, the school offers a four-year degree, designed to inspire and equip students to be leaders on a global scale, leaders who transform the world they live in as stewards of God's kingdom and the resources He has given us.

"King's is poised to deliver the next level of leading edge education in business and meet a crucial opportunity in the broader Christian community. We're excited to partner with a group of visionary advisors and sponsors to help us meet this challenge," says President Humphreys.

Board of Governors Chair **BILL DIEPEVEEN** agrees, adding, "We need more people in business who come with a Christian perspective, who understand what justice and mercy are all about in the field of commerce."

The immediate result of the new school of business includes retaining students who can now fulfill all their requirements at King's to earn their accountant designation, thanks to new Accounting courses. The school is also adding a course on *Environmentally and Socially Sustainable Business*, and signing three memoranda of understanding with Christian

universities in different corners of Europe (*more on these in a future issue*). These agreements will allow the exchange of students, professors and ideas as King's aims to prepare the leaders of tomorrow. There's much more to come, including new programs, courses, speakers and events in five streams: Global Learning Experience, Entrepreneurship and Family Business, Leadership Forums, Corporate Leader Mentorship, and Professional & Distance Education.

The new school is built on the solid foundation of King's decade-old Commerce degree that has already launched many successful careers in various aspects of both forprofit and non-profit enterprises around the world. As 2012 Commerce grad Ben Battjes put it, "King's has prepared me for the future, reinforcing the core values of my Christian faith and helping me develop critical thinking skills for business and everyday life." His time at King's helped him launch a career in commercial real estate, and he's now a development manager.



"Students who come to King's are not prepared to play it safe," says **GORD PRESTON**, Associate Professor, Management & Commerce. "They are encouraged to challenge their thinking, to change the world." An integrated worldview formed before graduation prepares students to bring God's kingdom to the world of commerce.

All faculty at the Leder School of Business either hold a doctorate or are completing a doctoral degree and are engaged in ongoing research. A low teacher-to-student ratio allows for more one-on-one interaction and classroom discussion, and students take courses across a broad range of disciplines, not just Business. As **DR. ELDEN WIEBE**, Dean of the Leder School of Business puts it, "The integration of a Commerce degree into a liberal arts education makes students much more rounded academically and broadens their thinking."

One of the visionaries for the new School of Business was **PAUL BATTJES**, Senior Major Gifts Officer at King's and



a former Hospital Foundation CEO – also the father of two grads and one current student at King's. Paul was instrumental in furthering this vision by conducting dozens of interviews with business people and King's supporters and cultivating key financial support: "Once people saw the impact this initiative would have in providing faith-based education for future business leaders, they were inspired to become involved."

As DR. ELDEN WIEBE aptly concludes: "God has been at work in all kinds of ways, pulling together all kinds of parts, together with the funding, which is fundamentally based on a vision. And all of this is spilling out into a blessing." *

OSH NOBLE, Manager for Alumni Relations, sat down with King's Alumna **HEIDI WAGNER** (BA, '01, B.Ed. '02) owner of The Melting Pot in Edmonton.

J: Hi Heidi, I appreciate you taking some time to chat. You played basketball during your time at King's – what else stands out about your experience of King's?

H: Well, one major thing was always the sense of community and the environment. I was originally taking classes at Grant MacEwan and was recruited to play basketball at King's. I ultimately was swayed by the sense of community that I found here... people really cared about people.

Follow your gut and don't be afraid to take risks if it is something you really want to do. I just knew that this restaurant would be a success. You need to trust yourself with what you are pursuing.

J: So, is the work worth it?

H: Yes. Absolutely. I am able to enjoy the work and what we can do at the restaurant. I mean, it's not all fun and games! But, we do get to be a part of special occasions. We have people get engaged, come for bridal showers and even have had a couple wedding dinners. It's an honour to be able to share in these special moments with our guests. I love that. Christian perspective continues to be relevant

Dr. Henk Van Andel, former president of The King's University, is a busy man. Catching him at home long enough for a telephone conversation isn't easy. Even though he retired in July, 2005, after serving as president since January, 1985, he's not sitting in his easy chair watching television. He continues to live his faith. For five years following his retirement, Van Andel served as the Executive Director of Christian Studies International, an organization that sponsors Christian professors to teach at universities in developing countries. More recently he was Stated Clerk of Classis Alberta North of the Christian Reformed Church, a regional grouping of 32 congregations in Northern Alberta.



He is an active member of the Edmonton Northeast Rotary Club, where he served as President in 2009-2010. Through Rotary, he has been managing a project to build bathrooms and simple farming infrastructure for about 200 families in a remote area of Ecuador.

Among his many involvements, he is still a dedicated member of The King's University

College Foundation and one of its longest-serving members. The Foundation, which he refers to as "Friends of Kings," raises funds for special projects, according to Van Andel. The Bachelor of Commerce degree and the Secondary Education Program are two examples of programs it has supported.

Fundraising isn't new to Van Andel. When he came to King's from the University of Montreal, where he was a professor of Physics, the college didn't have its own facilities. It rented space in downtown Edmonton. From 1988 to 1993, he was involved in raising funds for the new campus. A later campaign added a residence and new wing.

"Moving into our campus in 1993 was a big event," Van Andel says. "The fact that King's was accredited in 1987 for a limited number of programs, was another of the highlights."

King's was very small when he joined it as president, with only 100 students. "I thought it was a good challenge to help it grow and become a viable university," he says. Van Andel saw King's expand to 650 students during his tenure.

"What made its growth particularly challenging was that in order to attract new students and professors, King's had to grow in terms of programs, but you can't afford to offer more programs unless you have enough students to pay for them," he explains. Some consider that a vicious circle. Van Andel saw it as an interesting challenge.

Van Andel came to King's because he believes in the value of Christian higher education.

Most of his own post-secondary education took place at the University of British Columbia, in the province where his family settled on coming to Canada from Holland when he was 14. Prior to that, he spent a formative year at Calvin College in Michigan, which is supported by his church.

"Calvin College, being a Christian College similar to King's, introduced me to these ideas at the university level," he says.

He continues to devote time to King's because he thinks a Christian perspective on life and the world is very important.

Given the economic inequities in the world, and the threat to the environment, he believes there is an even greater need for universities like King's. "A Christian Perspective is founded in the biblical principles of social and economic justice, stewardship of and respect for God's creation, and service to our fellow human beings, especially those that are poor and disadvantaged." What could be more timely?

"King's has great potential," according to Van Andel. "It has a strong faculty and a well-defined mission which will stand it in good stead in the future."

He expects it to continue to attract more students and expand its offerings to more diverse programs. *
