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### **Remembering Our Amigo Gerardo – A Path Less Travelled**

**O**n Sunday May 18, Micah Centre friend and partner Gerardo Debbink passed away in Cuernavaca, Mexico after a months-long battle with illness.

Gerardo was a treasured companion on our journey toward God's dream of a just world, most recently through his role as the director of the Quest Mexico program in Cuernavaca, Mexico, Each February for over 10 years, Micah Centre students participated in a 10-day visit to Quest Mexico, where they encountered examples of justice seeking, peace building, and Indigenous resistance while exploring central Mexico's beautiful culture, landscapes, and history. King's alum often tell me that their week in Mexico with Gerardo held some of the most impactful moments of their time at King's.

Gerardo was integral to the Quest experience. He served our students as program director (students will remember his justice-themed 'quest' activity into downtown Cuernavaca), guest speaker organizer (all of our speakers were Gerardo's friends from his past justice and development work), translator, driver, host (we stayed and ate at Gerardo's home for the entire week), and storyteller. Each year at Quest, I would challenge students to convince Gerardo to tell them his own story. He was always reticent to talk about himself, preferring to share the stories of the poor and the justiceseekers that he had come to love. But our students' persistence would inevitably wear him down, and he would share his own remarkable story: a story that began with his participation in a cattle drive from Edmonton to central Mexico as a young dairy farmer from Leduc, and ended decades later with his role as a community-builder and organizer in Cuernavaca, Mexico (with many entertaining and difficult bumps along the way).

Gerardo reintroduced me to the pedagogy of 'see-judge-act' which he learned from the Latin American liberation theologians, a teaching practice that has

become core to my own teaching at King's. He encouraged our students to see the world around them with curiosity and empathy, to judge (critically engage) their world according to a faith-inspired vision of justice and peace, and then to ask how they should act differently as a result.

On the wall of the classroom at Gerardo's home, you will find a Lilla Watson quote that he loved:

"If you have come here to help me you are wasting your time, but if you have come because your liberation is bound up with mine, then let us work together."

Gerardo shaped the Quest student experience according to this vision. More importantly, though, he lived out of the same conviction. He will be missed by all of us at the Micah Centre.



## Honduras Water Project: 30 Years and Counting! A Return to El Cedrito

onduras Water Project is celebrating 30 years of partnership with The King's University! From May 6-23, a team of 5 students and 2 faculty were in the settlement of El Cedrito in southern Honduras, near the Nicaraguan border. Honduras Water Project comes alongside year-round, ongoing efforts headed by World Renew Honduras. King's teams travel to the region each May to learn about sustainable development and the importance of local oversight and input. The project has several partners in addition to King's and World Renew: Northern Alberta Diaconal Conference, the Frank Flaman Foundation, and Diaconía Nacional.

While there, the King's team lended a hand digging trenches and establishing water storage and transport systems as well as improving sanitation practices. They also learned about development initiatives already established: health clinics, hydroponics, small-scale farming, and local water board governance. Finally, the team visited the offices of ASJ (Association for a More Just Society), a non-profit organization founded by Jo Ann Van Engen and Kurt Ver Beek 27 years ago whose mission is simple: "We strive to be brave Christians, dedicated to doing justice in Honduras and to inspiring others around the world to seek justice in their own contexts." ASJ is a leader in putting their mission in action, exposing complex societal corruption, empowering citizens to demand justice, and achieving equitable local solutions.

Kayla Soetaert, a 2025 graduate (and Valedictorian), returned to Honduras for a third year in a row! I asked her why she was so eager to celebrate her graduation with this trip:

I return to Honduras each year to witness the local community become empowered – it is truly remarkable. We often think of this project as just building a waterline, a pila, or a floor - and while people experiencing poverty have real deficits in those material areas, I think the deficits go much deeper. A lot of times you also see a lack of self-esteem and a lack of self-confidence. So, when you're working on the water project, you can see people coming together as a community to not only rebuild a waterline, floor, or pila, but also rebuild their sense of self; you witness them using their gifts and talents. And especially, seeing the sense of community that they have is truly inspiring. When we are living with them in the village, we are not only just helping out with construction, we are sharing meals, and sharing laughs when I mess up in Spanish! Building these relationships has been crucial for me and is the reason that I return every year! (edited for clarity)

## Student Refugee Program Thriving Two Students on Campus, Third Coming!

or a third year, The King's University will welcome a refugee student to campus this August through our partnership with World University Service of Canada. King's is in a unique position to provide a Christian, small campus experience to a refugee student who has not had access to the university studies they have dreamed of. In fact, King's is the only Christian university in Canada to provide this scholarship and immigration sponsorship.

Students from the first two years of this program remain as students on campus. The student who just completed her first year of studies is a Computing Science major. She has much to be proud of, completing her first year of challenging classes and labs! She has thoroughly enjoyed life at King's. She has made many friends and is a delightful addition to our student body. She has a positive, persevering attitude, and is a conscientious hard-worker! She is caring and looks out for others, actively involving herself in Chapel events and social activities. We are grateful to learn and live alongside her, and we look forward to celebrating her academic path with her.

In August, a third refugee student will arrive on campus. A cohort is developing, and mentorship opportunities abound. The students at King's are even building community with other local WUSC SRP students in Edmonton!

Sponsorship of refugee students is a two-fold process. The university provides tuition support and housing, and as staff we seek monetary donations for living expenses. King's contribution to the refugee student account is valued at \$26,000 per year. Material living expenses are paid for by donors to the Student Refugee Program at King's. \$15,000 is needed each year to cover the costs of food, clothing, technology, WUSC EUMC LOCAL COMMITTEE COMITÉ LOCAL

dental/medical needs, dorm furnishings, transportation, school supplies, and immigration coordination.
