# **KEYNOTE SPEAKERS**



**Dr. Neal DeRoo** is Canada Research Chair in Phenomenology and Philosophy of Religion and Professor of Philosophy at the King's University in Edmonton. He is the author of many publications on religion and contemporary European philosophy, including *Futurity in Phenomenology* (2013). He was the Founding Editor of *in All things* (inallthings.org), an online hub for thinking through the implications of the lordship of Christ in all aspects of life, and has served in executive positions or on the board of the Andreas Center for Reformed Scholarship and Service, the Institute for Christian Studies, *Christian Scholar's Review*, and the *Canadian Journal for Scholarship and the Christian Faith*, among others. He currently lives with his wife and two kids in the woods east of Sherwood Park.



**Dr. Gerda Kits** has taught Economics at The King's University since 2011. She has a BA in Environmental Studies from King's, a Masters in Development Economics from Dalhousie University, and a PhD in Agricultural and Resource Economics from the U of A. Her research focuses on the Alberta oil sands, educating for reconciliation, and economics education. When not at work, she enjoys camping, hiking in God's beautiful creation, and gardening.



**Dr. Leah Martin-Visscher** is an associate professor of chemistry at The King's University. Her research involves looking at natural ways to control food spoilage and pathogenic bacteria, using either bacteriocins (bacterially produced peptides) or bacteriophages (viruses that kill bacteria). Leah loves to cook and garden, and this summer learned how to knit (although at the moment she's limited to toques, leg warmers and scarves). Leah is married to Darcy Visscher (associate professor of Biology at King's) and they have three lovely and busy children – Maia, Violet, and Niko.



**Dr. Arlette Zinck** is an Associate Professor of English and the Dean of the Faculty of Arts. She joined The King's University community in 1998 and served as the first Dean of the Faculty of Arts from 2008 to 2011. She resumed the post in 2015. She is a Seventeenth-Century scholar, specializing in the work of English Puritan writer John Bunyan. Zinck is first and foremost a teacher. Her passion for the classroom carries over to her volunteer work where she and her colleagues developed a support program for a small group of Correctional Services of Canada inmates. Her work with prisoners was recognized in 2012 with a Queen Elizabeth Diamond Jubilee Medal. In 2018, Zinck's excellence in teaching was recognized when she was selected to receive a 3M National Teaching Fellowship.

#### Capitalism at the Cross: A Cost-Benefit Analysis of Christian Discipleship

Most of us have a gut-level sense that unhindered consumption is maybe not easily compatible with Christian faith. We know greed is bad but mostly like the idea of a free economy. What's an honest Christian to do in the world such as we find it today? A pastoral and theological analysis, with conversation.

**Paul Cumin** is senior pastor at Lendrum Mennonite Church, here in Edmonton, and an adjunct professor of theology with the Mennonite Brethren Biblical Seminary. He's a dad to three teenagers, and the author of *Christ at the Crux* (Wipf and Stock, 2014).

#### Whose Money Is It Anway: Should Private Schools Get Public Dollars?

**N209** 

Pierre-Elliot Trudeau, the father of Canada's current Prime Minister, once said that "government has no place in the bedrooms of the nation." This interactive discussion will likewise suggest that government has little or no place in the schools of the nation. We will look at the validity of the private/public distinction as it pertains to schooling and explore the limited role that government should play in determining curriculum and who should and shouldn't receive funding for formal educational enterprises.

**Dr. Robert (Bob) Bruinsma** is a Professor of Education (Emeritus) who is the founding faculty member of The King's University Bachelor of Education programs. He worked at King's from 1981 to 2009. He is currently a member of board of the Centre for Family Literacy.

#### Overdressed: At What Cost?

N210

Have you ever bought clothes from a retail store so cheaply that you did not think twice about the purchase? Did you ever wonder why they are so cheap, who made them, how old they were, what conditions they work and/or live in? Did you ever ask yourself who really benefits from your purchases and where the bulk of the money goes? How should we ethically and sustainably relate with the items that form our most immediate environment? We are invited to think critically but also hopefully about these questions. This session will explore the true costs of fast fashion pitting it against alternative options such as the so-called slow or sustainable fashion.

**Daniel Muthui** is an Edmonton-based fashion designer and founder of Ethno Fashion Gala, a runway event that raises the profiles of local fashion designers who are committed to sustainable ways of producing clothing. Daniel's clothing line is called Peach Blue Clothing, specializing in handmade contemporary African and other clothing. Daniel graduated from The King's University in 2012 with BA in Politics History and Economics (PHE) and a Micah Certificate.

#### **Not Business as Usual**

N120

As the dominant social institution in contemporary western culture business is expected to be the moral pacesetter of the 21st century. What could possibly go wrong?

**Dr. Gordon Preston** is an Associate Professor in the Leder School of Business at King's. His research is primarily in the area of inter-institutional collaboration. He also owns and manages a learning design company specializing in adapting complex learning to an online environment.

#### A World Without Money?

N109

In this session, we will examine how some scholars and thinkers have imagined a world in the future without money. We will see what the basis of their argument is for a world which has abolished money, what these societies might look like in practice, and what we think about this. We will look at the writings of some anarchist and communist thinkers and consider the extent to which money is a historically conditioned entity which is destined to disappear in the future.

Mark Sandle likes football (or soccer) a lot. He comes from England originally and is a history professor at King's. If you buy him a coffee he might tell you about the time he was followed by the KGB and ended up inadvertently in a revolution.

#### You're not Using Apps ... Apps are Using You

N118

Attention engineers at major tech companies are hired to maximize the amount of time that people are spending on their technology. The longer they can keep you hooked, the more they can advertise to you, collect your data for profit and keep you using their products. Can we do anything to take some control back for ourselves?

**Amy Feaver** is a professor of mathematics and computing science at The King's University. She enjoys salsa dancing, number theory, snuggling with her cat Data, building things with Legos, combinatorics, sleeping, probabilistic algorithms and petting zoos. She is currently writing a third sentence, because she was told that she had to write a 3-sentence bio.

#### A Mathematician Reflects on Counting and Value

N111

Money is applied mathematics: using numbers to define the value of things. This conference will lead you through many perspectives, including the theology, philosophy, psychology, and sociology of money; but a mathematician is someone whose purpose is to think deeply about numbers in themselves. From that place of deep reflection, what can a mathematician say about money, counting and assigning value?

#### Make a Difference TODAY! Voluntourism, "Poverty Porn," and Using our Wealth to Help - or Hurt - The Poor

Is it possible that our awareness campaigns, service projects, and fundraising may actually hurt those we are trying to help, at home and around the world? In this session, we will explore how the stories we tell – about ourselves and about the poor – may cause more harm than good in our attempts to build a better world. Together we will ask ourselves some challenging and awkward questions in the search for more faithful, empowering, and just ways to use our resources.

Jonathan Nicolai-deKoning is the Program Director of The Micah Centre at The King's University, whose aim is to foster greater understanding and awareness among the King's community around issues of global poverty, peacemaking, and social justice.

#### The Lucrative World of Human Trafficking

N110

Human trafficking is the exploitation of a person for sex/labour, domestic servitude or organ removal. It's happening in Canada, in Alberta, in Edmonton. Human trafficking represents a gross violation of a person's human rights. In this session, participants will learn; what is human trafficking, myths surrounding human trafficking, the difference between human trafficking and human smuggling, the financial complexities of this crime, who potentially can become a victim of human trafficking, red flags and indicators, how human trafficking presents in Alberta, barriers to assisting victims of human trafficking, what is ACT Alberta, and how we can work together to assist victims.

Jessica Brandon has more than 15 years of advocacy and volunteer experience with a focus on Human Rights. She began as a volunteer with ACT Alberta 3 years ago and stepped into the Training and Education Management role full-time in May 2018. Over the last year, Jessica has presented to over 2000 attendees on behalf of the Action Coalition on Human Trafficking.

#### **Simplifying the Money Conversation**

N119

In this session, we will explore the four elements of financial confidence: Heart, Health, Habits, and Hope as outlined in Simplifying the Money Conversation by the Ron Blue Institute. These elements unlock a framework empowering a lifetime of excellent financial decisions.

This session is led by representatives of the Christian Credit Union: David van Berkel, CFP®, CKA® Financial Advisor, Rob Drost, FPSC Level 1®, Certificate in Financial Planning, Financial Advisor, and Ryan Van Niejenhuis, Insurance Advisor.

#### Your Money, or Your Life? The Real Secret to Happiness

N102

What does the science of happiness say about our relationship with money? How much money is enough? Does money really buy happiness? How do I align my heart and soul aspirations for a good life with the need to earn an income (make money)? Is the notion of "making money" a lie? As a student and future labourer in the economy, how do I balance my work, life, and genuine happiness? Learn how you can you measure and manage your well-being in harmony with making a reasonable amount of money, so that your soul or spiritual well-being is flourishing; a from the French word floris meaning "to flower."

Mark Anielski is a happiness economist and author of the award-winning book The Economics of Happiness: Building Genuine Wealth (2007) and his second book, An Economy of Well-being: Common Sense Tools for Building Genuine Wealth and Happiness, will explore this fun range of topics that he hopes will leave students and faculty thinking about money and the pursuit of happiness through a new and refreshing lens.

#### Big Pharma, Big Problems, Big Questions

We value our health - and that is clearly reflected by Canada's commitment to universal healthcare. Or is it? Approximately one in ten Canadians cannot cover the cost of prescription drugs. But whose fault is that? Do branded drugs have to be expensive to recoup R&D costs? To offset the lost revenue when generic drugs appear? To finance potential lawsuits? Or, are drug prices simply driven by a profit—maximizing mentality? In this breakout session, we will explore the complexities surrounding the price of prescription drugs, and what that reflects about our values.

# WORKSHOPS (WEDNESDAY, 1 P.M.)

#### **Knowing Your Options When Paying for Post-Secondary**

N108

This session will highlight the funding supports you need to know about when planning for and paying for your post-secondary education and where to look for non-repayable/free funding options. The session will include some money management tips and pitfalls to avoid while in post-secondary studies.

Rachel De Leon is currently the Bursary Program Coordinator in Student Financial Support at the University of Alberta. She is a financial aid specialist with 20 years of proven success in establishing and managing financial supports and funding options, providing money management expertise including resources and referrals, for post-secondary students.

#### A Visual Guide to Interdisciplinary Studies



This plant symbolizes the learning goals the IS faculty committee has for students attending the Interdisciplinary Studies conferences. You will see these labels in different places in the program events to help you see how all the pieces fit together.

- **ROOTS** What's going on "beneath the surface" of an issue; the soil and nutrients that go into how people view things; this helps you learn to see the world as shaped by various values/commitments
- **STEM** How the root shapes the surface appearance of the issue; this helps you make connections between the root issues and how this actually plays out in the world and how we live
- LEAVES The various disciplinary approaches that show the complexity of the issue; you can see how different people in different areas are working to engage this issue, and gives you a "real-life" example of how you might participate in transforming the world
